PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT — MARCH 2024

Hello all our members,

I am hoping that everyone is enjoying a prosperous 2024 so far. With our frequent wind and rain this year, I am told that Giardia associated diarrhea is keeping the Flagyl and Fenbendazole flying off the shelves. Seems like a good time to be in the soft stool treatment business. Please feel free to let me know what types of disease your practices are seeing increases in so that we can keep each other informed. Changes in the ways that reference laboratories share information with public health agencies make it more important for our local community to communicate what we are seeing on the frontlines.

On the topic of public health, I have been asked to invite our members to take part in a short survey. Dr. Kim Conway is the One Health lead veterinarian at the California Department of Public Health, Center for Environmental Health. They are conducting a statewide survey of California companion animal veterinarians on the topic of antimicrobial prescription practices. The data collected is aimed at combating antimicrobial resistance through the development of materials that may benefit California veterinarians and their patients. Please note this survey will only be open through the end of March.

On another note concerning the government's role in animal disease and welfare, we are expecting a visit to San Francisco by animal scientists from China in May or June 2024. The Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Bureau of Shandong Province is planning a delegation visit to America. The purpose of their visit is to meet face to face and "get an overall understanding of your policies and measures of: animal health and welfare, veterinary public health, [the] latest developments in veterinary medicine, and to exchange views and experience of animal disease prevention and control. Any of our members

whose shelter or practice is interested in meeting with them can contact me for the contact of their lead delegate.

This whole President's letter is turning out to be almost entirely public health themed. However, I also need to bring up Animal Care and Control's Rabies Clinics one last time. We voted in November to discontinue the SFVMA's association with future clinics. They have scheduled one last event where I committed to finding a DVM to be on site. It is on March 9th and I would consider it a personal favor if any of our members could volunteer. For future clinics, veterinarians can always volunteer directly through ACC.

Our next meeting will have CE presented by Doctors Ken Gorczyca and Ari Rozycki from A Gentle Rest. They will discuss hospice / end of life counseling for clients and advances in euthanasia protocols. In addition, they will address emotional support for doctors and support staff dealing with these challenging cases. There is much that can be covered in this discussion. In order to optimize our time Dr. Gorczyca has put together a brief survey for members that will be attending. Lastly, I need to express tremendous appreciation to Doctor Emily Adamson for agreeing to take on the role of our new SFVMA Vice President. Consider taking on a volunteer veterinarian position in SF. Especially consider the seat on the SF Animal Control and Welfare Commission. I have filled the veterinarian's seat for many years and it is time for a new person to take over. The monthly meetings can be very interesting and address a myriad of issues like local food animal processing, community cats, neighborhood wildlife, feral pigeons, bats, neglected dogs, aggressive dogs, glue trap legislation, chinatown wet markets, local coyotes, and oversight of our Department of Animal Care and Control (amongst other engaging topics).

Looking forward to seeing everyone in March.

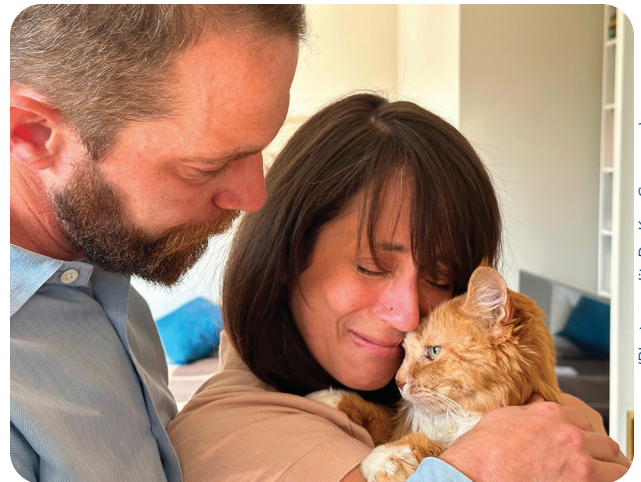

SFAfA Grant Examples

General Guidelines

(GIA and Tauber Funds are available for any case, please use all of your funds)

- 1 The pet must have an urgent need for medical care.
- 2 The case has a good prognosis.
- 3 If it's a long term problem, the clinic must be able to provide ongoing care.
- 4 Your client must have exhausted all other financial options.
- 5 Your hospital will provide a matching or greater discount/donation of in-kind services
- 6 Your client must reside in, or have significant connection to, the San Francisco Bay Area.

Condition Examples

(List is not all inclusive. Please reach out to us with any questions!)

- Infectious diseases (Parvo virus, feline panleukopenia, influenza, anaplasmosis...
- Hepatitis / Liver Disease

LETTER FROM ANIMAL CARE & CONTROL

Dear Practice Owners/Managers,

Thank you for being part of the San Francisco animal community and caring for the many pets in our City.

We understand that this is a demanding time for veterinary practices. We are writing to remind you that the San Francisco Health Code requires that all rabies vaccination information for dogs must be reported to the Department of Animal Care and Control within 30 days of administration.

To maintain compliance please submit copies of your rabies information to **acc.rabies@sfgov.org** by the 5th of every month. Attached is a sample spreadsheet containing the required information. If your system is unable to produce a report, please provide a pdf version of your rabies certificates. The rabies certificates must contain the following fields:

Dog licensing is required by law as part of our rabies control program. Licensing also remains an essential tool in returning lost pets to their guardians. It also helps SFACC determine where to focus our outreach and emergency planning efforts.

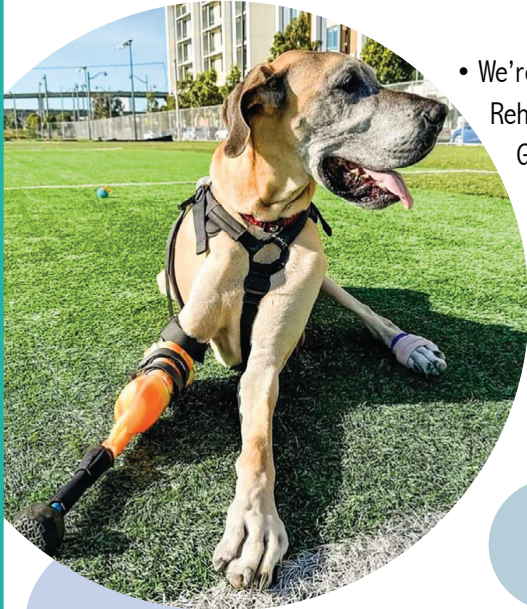
The city is currently using licenses made by Pet Hub (www.pethub.com) that include a QR code where the basic plan enables anyone who finds a dog to scan the code and obtain owner-supplied information about the pet and its family, speeding reunification. Last fiscal year, SFACC reunited 54% of stray dogs with their owners through our lost and found programs.

Thousands of animals need care during and after disasters. Some 63% of California households have pets, including an estimated 10 million pet cats, nine million dogs, and one million horses. Other pets, farm animals, and wildlife also need assistance during and after disasters like earthquakes, floods, and wildfires.

Veterinary professionals are vital to animals during disasters. The mission of the California Veterinary Medical Reserve Corps (CAVMRC) is to provide veterinary professionals with the training and credentialing necessary to support animal health and public health.

Deployment is always voluntary. Volunteers get involved at whatever level works for them – assistants are needed as well as leaders, part-time responders are as welcome as those who can help out for a week or two, plus there are ongoing roles in areas such as planning and disaster response. Volunteer participation can be a matter of life or death for rescued animals and means the world to the owners of those animals.

BENEFITS OF JOINING THE CAVMRC

The CAVMRC provides veterinary professionals:

- Credentialing necessary to support animal health and public health emergency response.
- Continuing education and training opportunities that allow you to strengthen your skills to better serve your practice, your community and our state.

Volunteer Vet Techs Needed at PAWS (Pets Are Wonderful Support)

PAWS mission is to preserve, support and nurture the human-animal bond for those most vulnerable in our community, low-income San Francisco residents who are seniors (over 60 years old) and/or persons living with a disability, with pet food and vet care, among its services.

Volunteer Vet Techs assist one of our licensed Volunteer Veterinarians with exams and nail trims at our Ask The Vet consultations. Our vet exam room is located in the PAWS building in the Mission neighborhood of San Francisco.

Volunteer Vet Techs do not need to be licensed vet techs, but must have a minimum of one year experience working in a veterinary environment, and feel comfortable performing animal restraint and animal handling tasks within a limited clinic environment.
